Introduction

The North East Learning Trust is the Admissions Authority responsible for determining and applying this policy in the following Academies:

- Browney Academy
- Sacriston Academy
- Diamond Hall Junior Academy
- Easington Academy
- Teesdale School and Sixth Form
- The Academy at Shotton Hall
- Ashington Academy
- Bedlington Academy

The Trust will consider all admission applications sent to them by the Local Authority (LA) and will apply the policy fairly and consistently to every application received.

Published Admission Number (PAN)

The PAN is the number of places we intend to make available for our normal intake. Once the PAN has been set for an Academy we will not refuse any applications submitted during the normal admission round for Reception, Year 3, and Year 7 where the PAN has not been exceeded.

However, if there is an unexpectedly high demand and the Trust believes we could admit additional children, we will inform the LA and either admit children above the agreed PAN or increase the PAN accordingly to accommodate more children.

Applying for a place in reception

To apply for a place at Browney Academy and Sacriston Academy parents/carers should complete the common application form supplied by Durham LA. The completed application form must be returned to the LA by no later than **15 January 2019**. Any

application forms received after that date will be classed as 'late' and will not be dealt with until all applications received on time have been through the application process.

Address

The address given must be where the child and parents/carers live permanently. It must not be that of a childminder, grandparent, or other relative's address. If parents/carers share custody of a child then the Trust may request to see the court order, child tax credit letter, child benefit letter, medical card, or other evidence to establish where the child is resident for most of the time during weekdays. *If there is joint custody for the child, then the address of the parent/carer receiving the child benefit will be used.*

Oversubscription Criteria for Browney Academy and Sacriston Academy

1. Children who are 'looked after' or a child who was previously looked after but immediately after being looked after became subject to an adoption, child arrangements, or special guardianship.

A looked after child is a child who is, at the time of making an application to a school, (a) in the care of the local authority, or (b) being provided with accommodation by a local authority in the exercise of their social services functions. (see definition in section 22(1) of the Children Act 1989.

2. Medical reasons

Children with very exceptional medical factors directly related to school placement.

3. Sibling links

Children who have a sibling already attending the Academy and who is expected to be on roll at the school at the time of admission.

4. Children of staff employed at the academy

Children of staff employed at the Academy for two or more years at the time at which the application for admission is made and/or the member of staff has been recruited to fill a post where there is a demonstrable skill shortage, and/or the member of staff has relocated.

4. Distance

Children who live nearest the preferred Academy measured by the shortest walking route. This will be based on the child's address. Where the last place to be allocated would mean that a multiple birth sibling group i.e. twins, triplets, or other multiple birth sibling groups, would be split, the sibling group will be given priority over other children. Otherwise, if only one final place can be offered, and two applicants live equidistant from the Academy, the Trust's system of random allocation will apply.

In assessing home to Academy distance, the measure will be by the shortest walking route. Routes are measured from the centre point of the applicant's house, or in the case

of a flat from the centre point of the building, to the nearest Academy entrance. A Geographic Information System (GIS) is used to identify and measure the shortest walking route. The GIS identifies routes on the Ordnance Survey Integrated Transport Network and Urban Paths Network, which are national recognised datasets. The routes include all man-made paths i.e. those that are metalled or surfaced.

Notification of places

The formal offer of a place will be issued by Durham LA who will write to parents/carers on **16 April 2019**.

Waiting lists/appeals

The Academy will maintain the waiting list. Positions on the waiting list will be determined solely in accordance with the oversubscription criteria. Where places become vacant they will be allocated to children on the waiting list in accordance with the oversubscription criteria.

Definition of Statutory School Age for Primary Phase Children

Legally, children do not have to be in full time education until the term following their fifth birthday. This is compulsory school age. However, children are normally admitted to school in the September following their fourth birthday.

Child's Fifth Birthday	Can defer until	If deferred child will join class.
1 September – 31 December	January	Reception class
1 January – 31 March	April	Reception Class
1 April – 31 August	Please see section 'Deferred entry to reception class, but if a summer born child defers entry to the following September they would be expected to enter a Year 1 class full-time.	

Deferred entry to reception class

Where an applicant to reception is below compulsory school age the parent/carers can request:

- a) That the date their child is admitted is deferred until later in the academic year or until the term in which the child reaches compulsory school age; or
- b) That their child takes up the place part-time until the child reaches compulsory school age.

Delayed entry to reception class

Summer born children (children born from the beginning of April to the end of August) reach compulsory school age in the September following their fifth birthday. If a parent/carer wishes for their summer born child to start school in the reception year group in the September following their fifth birthday the Trust will decide based on the circumstances of the individual case. Factors considered may include:

- In the case of children born prematurely, the fact that they may have naturally fallen into the lower age group if they had been born on their expected date of birth;
- Whether delayed social, emotional, cognitive, or physical development is adversely affecting their readiness for school;
- Whether they have been previously educated outside their normal age group.

Applying for a place in Year 3

To apply for a place at Diamond Hall Junior Academy parents/carers should complete the common application form supplied by Sunderland City Council. The completed application form must be returned to the City Council by no later than **15 January 2019**. Any application forms received after that date will be classed as 'late' and will not be dealt with until all applications received on time have been through the application process.

Address

The address given must be where the child and parents/carers live permanently. It must not be that of a childminder, grandparent, or other relative's address. If parents/carers share custody of a child then the Trust may request to see the court order, child tax credit letter, child benefit letter, medical card, or other evidence to establish where the child is resident for most of the time during weekdays. *If there is joint custody for the child, then the address of the parent/carer receiving the child benefit will be used.*

Oversubscription criteria for Diamond Hall Junior Academy

1. 'Looked-after' child – a child that is 'looked-after' by a Local Authority, in accordance with Section 22 of the Children's Act 1989 and a child who was looked after, but ceased to be so, because of adoption (or become subject to a residence order or special guardianship order).

2. Attendance in Key Stage 1 (age 4-6+) at Diamond Hall Infant School.

3. A sibling link – an older brother/sister or older child (including adoptive or step-children) that shares the same parent/carer and lives at the same address, who will still be attending the preferred school or the junior school for which the preferred school is the feeder infant school, at the time of admission.

4. Children of staff employed at the Academy

Children of staff employed at the Academy for two or more years at the time at which the application for admission is made and/or the member of staff has been recruited to fill a post where there is a demonstrable skill shortage, and/or the member of staff has relocated.

5. Exceptional medical or psychological (you must include a medical or psychological report, prepared by a professional, to confirm information which you include in this section. This report should explain why only this school can meet your child's medical or psychological needs. Common childhood medical conditions such as asthma or giving a child's nervousness at starting a new school as a psychological reason for choosing a school are unlikely to be accepted as exceptional). If you intend to use this criterion when expressing a preference, please contact the School Admissions Team completing the application form.

5. Pupils for whom preferences are expressed on grounds other than those outlined above.

Within each of the above categories, places will be offered based on distance from the centre of the home to the main entrance(s) of the school with priority being given to those living closest to the school. Distance will be measured by the shortest safest walking distance, using a Geographical Information System (GIS).

Where a pupil has an Education, Health and Care Plan naming a school, a place will be offered subject to confirmation by the Council's SEN Unit).

Waiting lists/appeals

Positions on the waiting list will be determined solely in accordance with the oversubscription criteria. Where places becoming vacant they will be allocated to children

on the waiting list in accordance with the oversubscription criteria. There will be no waiting list available after 31 December 2019.

Applying for a place in Year 7 in County Durham

To apply for a place at a secondary Academy within the Trust parents/carers should complete the common application form supplied by Durham Local Authority. The completed application form must be returned to the Local Authority by no later than **31 October 2018**. Any application forms received after that date will be classed as 'late' and will not be dealt with until all applications received on time have been through the application process.

Address

The address given must be where the child and parents/carers live permanently. It must not be that of a childminder, grandparent, or other relative's address. If parents/carers share custody of a child then the Trust may request to see the court order, child tax credit letter, child benefit letter, medical card, or other evidence to establish where the child is resident for most of the time during weekdays. *If there is joint custody for the child, then the address of the parent/carer receiving the child benefit will be used.*

Oversubscription Criteria for Easington Academy, Teesdale School, and The Academy at Shotton Hall

1. Children who are 'looked after' or a child who was previously looked after but immediately after being looked after became subject to an adoption, child arrangements or special guardianship order*.

A looked after child is a child who is, at the time of making an application to a school, (a) in the care of the local authority, or (b) being provided with accommodation by a local authority in the exercise of their social services functions. (see definition in section 22(1) of the Children Act 1989.

2. Medical reasons

Children with very exceptional medical factors directly related to school placement.

3. Sibling links

Children who have a sibling already attending the school and who is expected to be on roll at the time of admission.

4. Children of staff employed at the Academy

Children of staff employed at the Academy for two or more years at the time at which the application for admission is made and/or the member of staff has been recruited to fill a post where there is a demonstrable skill shortage, and/or the member of staff has relocated.

5. Distance

Those children who have applied for a place at the nearest school to their home address measured by the shortest walking route. This will be based on the child's address. Where the last place to be allocated would mean that a multiple birth sibling group i.e. twins, triplets, or other multiple birth sibling groups, would be split, the sibling group will be given priority over other children. Otherwise, if only one final place can be offered, and two applicants live equidistant from the Academy, the LA's system of random allocation will apply.

In assessing home to Academy distance, the measure will be by the shortest walking route. Routes are measured from the centre point of the applicant's house, or in the case of a flat from the centre point of the building, to the nearest Academy entrance. A Geographic Information System (GIS) is used to identify and measure the shortest walking route. 5. All other applicants

Tie-breaker

Where an Academy is oversubscribed within any of the categories above the following tiebreakers will be applied:

- a) For those children who have applied for a place at the school nearest to their home address (category 4), priority will be given to those who would otherwise have to travel the furthest distance to the next nearest school.
- b) For other children (category 5), priority will be given to those children who live nearest to the school applied for.

In the unlikely event of the Academy being oversubscribed within categories 1, 2 and 3 tiebreaker (b) will apply.

Late applications for a County Durham School Place

Applications received after the closing date of 31 October 2018 and before 28 January 2019 for secondary and for primary after the closing date of 15 January 2019 and prior to 6

March 2019, will be considered, and as far as possible, will be offered a school place on 1 March 2019 for secondary and 16 April 2019 for primary.

Applying for a place in Year 7 in Northumberland

To apply for a place at a secondary Academy within the Trust parents/carers should complete the common application form supplied by Northumberland County Council. The completed application form must be returned to the Local Authority by no later than **31 October 2019**. Any application forms received after that date will be classed as 'late' and will not be dealt with until all applications received on time have been through the application process.

Oversubscription Criteria for Ashington Academy and Bedlington Academy

1. Children who are 'looked after' or a child who was previously looked after but immediately after being looked after became subject to an adoption, child arrangements or special guardianship order*.

A looked after child is a child who is, at the time of making an application to a school, (a) in the care of the local authority, or (b) being provided with accommodation by a local authority in the exercise of their social services functions. (see definition in section 22(1) of the Children Act 1989.

2. Medical reasons

Children with very exceptional medical factors directly related to school placement.

3. Sibling links

Children who have a sibling already attending the school and who is expected to be on roll at the time of admission.

4. Children of staff employed at the Academy

Children of staff employed at the Academy for two or more years at the time at which the application for admission is made and/or the member of staff has been recruited to fill a post where there is a demonstrable skill shortage, and/or the member of staff has relocated.

5. Distance

Distance from the front door of the child's home to main gate of the school will be the deciding factor with preference being given to those whose home address is nearest to the school as measured in a straight line ('as the crow flies'). The distance checker is contained within the EMS school admissions software using GIS data. Distance checking is an integral function within the school admissions software ensuring consistency in measurement. This will be based on the child's address. Where the last place to be allocated would mean that a multiple birth sibling group i.e. twins, triplets, or other multiple birth sibling groups, would be split, the sibling group will be given priority over other children. Otherwise, if only one final place can be offered, and two applicants live equidistant from the Academy, the LA's system of random allocation will apply.

Children with disabilities will be treated no less favourably than other applicants for admission. Schools are under a duty to make reasonable adjustments to ensure that pupils with disabilities are not placed at a substantial disadvantage, and no child will be refused a place on the grounds of disability. A pupil has a disability if he or she has a physical or mental impairment that has a substantial and long-term adverse effect on his or her ability to carry out normal day-to-day activities.

In cases where an application for a place has been unsuccessful, parents may request that the child's name be placed on a waiting list for the school in question. Waiting lists can only apply to transfer year groups; Reception and Year 7 and will only be maintained until 31st December of the year in question. A place on the waiting list does not affect your right to appeal.

Those parents whose application to a school has been unsuccessful will be notified of their right of appeal to an Independent Appeal Panel. The School Standards and Framework Act 1998, gives this right to all parents whose application for a school has been unsuccessful. The decision of an Appeal Panel is binding on both the Admission Authority and the school. The School Admissions Appeals Code can be found on the DfE website at: www.DfE.gov.uk.

Late applications for a Northumberland School Place

If your application is late and is not considered as exceptional, you will not be offered a place on 1 March 2019. This will be the case even if you live in the catchment area for the school. If you are a Northumberland resident, you will get an offer on or after 1 March 2019.

Notification of Places

The formal offer of a place will be issued by the LA who will write to parents/carers on **1 March 2019**.

Waiting lists/appeals

The Academy will maintain the waiting list. Positions on the waiting list will be determined solely in accordance with the oversubscription criteria. Where places become vacant they will be allocated to children on the waiting list in accordance with the oversubscription criteria.

Withdrawing an offer of a place

The Trust reserves the right to withdraw an offer of a place if:

- It was made in error;
- Parent/carer fails to respond to the offer of a place within the agreed deadline;
- It is established that the offer of a place was obtained through fraudulent or misleading application.

If the year group is full or oversubscribed then a place will be refused, the applicant will be given the opportunity to appeal and an appeals form will be supplied. If the parent/carer chooses to appeal for a place the panel will be convened, and any decision made by the panel is legally binding.

Ashington Academy

The Admissions Authority for Ashington Academy is the North East Learning Trust, which is responsible for determining and applying the policy. Any query regarding sixth form admissions should be directed to the Academy.

Applications for the Sixth Form should be made directly to the Academy. Parents/carers or students wishing to apply for a place in the Sixth Form should telephone or email the Academy by the **15 February** in the year of admission.

Entry Requirements

Students wishing to join the Sixth Form to study a programme of Level 3 courses (i.e. A-level or Level 3 BTEC courses or a combination of both) are expected to enrol for and complete a minimum of three subjects, four for students with A* and A grades / grade 8 and 9 at GCSE. Students are expected to have achieved at least five GCSE passes at C grade / grade 4 or above or equivalent in five different subjects, with a minimum C grade or grade 5 in their chosen subjects (although some subjects do ask for a B grade or higher – see Post 16 Prospectus). Students that have not achieved a minimum of a grade 4 in GCSE English or Mathematics are expected to resit the subject(s) in the Sixth Form. All Level 3 students must

attend the compulsory weekly registration and briefing at 8.40am on Wednesday and Thursday mornings.

Bedlington Academy

The Admissions Authority for Bedlington Academy is the North East Learning Trust, which is responsible for determining and applying the policy. Any query regarding sixth form admissions should be directed to the Academy.

Applications for the Sixth Form should be made directly to the Academy. Parents/carers or students wishing to apply for a place in the Sixth Form should telephone or email the Academy by the **15 February** in the year of admission.

Entry Requirements

To gain access to our A Level and Level 3 courses students must achieve 5+ A*-C grades (or equivalents). There are 5 potential 'Pathways' to choose from:

- 4 A/S level courses
- 3 A/S courses
- 2 A/S level courses and 1 BTEC
- 2 BTEC courses and 2 A/S courses
- 3 BTEC courses
- 4 BTEC courses

Any student who has not gained at least a level 4 in Maths or English will be required to attend resit lessons for relevant subjects. These will not count as one of your study subjects as they do not make up the required teaching time to count towards a full-time student.

Attendance will be monitored closely and any student who drops below 97% attendance will be monitored by tutor and asked to make up missed time in NCT. Any student who drops below 95% will be required to meet with the Head of Sixth Form and without good reason or improvement is at risk of removal from our provision.

The admission number for external students entering the sixth form from will be **50** each year and all students must meet the specific requirements for each course they wish to study, details of which are outlined in the prospectus and on the website.

Teesdale School and Sixth Form

The Admissions Authority for Teesdale School and Sixth Form is the North East Learning Trust, which is responsible for determining and applying the policy. Any query regarding sixth form admissions should be directed to the school.

Applications for the Sixth Form should be made directly to the school. Parents/carers or students wishing to apply for a place in the Sixth Form should telephone or email the Academy by the **15 February** in the year of admission.

Admission to Year 12 of the sixth form will be from:

1. Pupils in Year 11 at Teesdale School and Sixth Form
2. Pupils in Year 11 from outside Teesdale School and Sixth Form

The admission number for students entering the sixth form from outside of Teesdale School and Sixth Form will be 100 each year and all students must meet the specific requirements for each course they wish to study, details of which are outlined in the prospectus and on the website.
